The launch of Volume 6 coincided with the two-day international conference on "Language, Literature and Community" jointly organized by the Department of English and Humanities, ULAB and the local chapter of the American Center.

Professor Jenny Sharpe of Comparative Literature and Gender Studies at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) presented the keynote paper at the conference held at ULAB on July 10-11, 2015. The two-day conference was inaugurated by the secretary to the Ministry of Education, Md. Nazrul Islam, with deputy chief of US Embassy in Dhaka, Ms. Ann McConnell, in attendance.

A total of 75 speakers, representing Bangladesh, India, South Korea, the United States of America and the United Kingdom, took part in the conference.
